Chad Rollins, 192 Cobourg Street

I joined the Board of ASH last year and currently serve as one of two Vice-Presidents and Chair of Planning Committee. Since joining the Board I've dedicated a lot of time and energy to my work, always trying to keep the best interests of Sandy Hill in mind.

I joined the Board because I was very concerned by bad development; in fact I compared this issue to a war. I'm happy to report that all our hard work over the last year is starting to pay off; we've won a few battles. New bylaws removing special provisions for conversions and implementing character requirements for infill have been implemented.

However, as the demolition of the Confederation-era Stewart-Dworkin House earlier this week demonstrates, we need to lobby the City on heritage protection. We also need to continue to work with the City on efforts to limit the height and mass of new infill in mature neighbourhoods.

If I'm elected as President, I'd like to see ASH articulate our mission and values; and develop a community-based vision for the future of Sandy Hill. I assure you that I will continue to work to represent the best interests of Sandy Hill and its residents and to protect and preserve the heritage and diversity that give Sandy Hill its unique character.
